KAYENTA JUDICIAL COURTS COMPLEX

Kayenta, Ariz. "Currently, there is only one courtroom in Kayenta," says Lavonne Yazzie, Kayenta District Court Manager. "When Department of Corrections bring inmates to the court, they bring them through the front door, and often they are mixed in with the general public, sometimes when young children and the elderly are present in the area. At times you will see a violent incident occur that involves fighting; at times, the bailiff has to contain them. There is a safety issue in the current facility," said Lavonne Yazzie.

There is a case of limited space at the Kayenta Court facilities. "We are definitely in need of new court facility," says Lavonne Yazzie. There is evidence that criminal cases Family Courts, Court Services, Probation, have gone up; criminal cases in Kayenta District are second highest on the Navajo Nation, Shiprock District being the highest with crime rates.





BIA LIGHT PROJECT:KAYENTA TOWNSHIP WETHERILL HEIGHTS

Kayenta, Ariz. Kayenta Township Community Development has been working with the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) 6485 Street Light Project. Heston Zonnie, Project Manager, Kayenta Township, says, "with all approvals in place, the design is at 100% completion, and construction documents are ready to go out for contractor bidding. We are hoping to get a contract in place by December and actual construction to begin not far behind in early 2020."

Kayenta Township Community Development has been working on the asphalt and sidewalks on BIA 6485 during the summer of 2019. Some of the newer plans have come to fruition, and according to Zonnie, the street lights have been in the works along with road improvement. "The turn around time for ordering the streetlights is about 7 - 8 weeks, but that doesn't mean the contractor has to start until the street lights come in as they can begin to other work. The scope of work for this project is the installation of the street lights between the curb and the sidewalk within the dirt strip. Landscape gravel will be placed between the sidewalk and curb and around the lighting."

Street lighting will begin at the intersection of U.S. 163 and BIA Route 6485 (where new road and sidewalk work was completed) and end up top right before NHA sub-division at Wetherill Heights. With an installation of 19 street lights and 820 square yards of landscape gravel, construction is estimated to take two months to complete.

"The proposed street lights will be more of a residential type of street lighting, so it'll be more of a decorative kind of street lighting as they call it," said Zonnie.

As with any significant projects, Kayenta Township has invested some money and cost into this project, and it will look enhanced once the lights are installed. Zonnie mentioned, "The cost of this project is estimated to be around \$250,000-\$300,000, so once we get a real price from the contractor, then we will know the actual cost.

"The goal of this project is to provide a safer environment for pedestrians walking at night, and motorists travel by lighting up the pathway and road," concluded Zonnie.



"With the mine closure, we have been anticipating more criminal cases and a spike in domestic violence in the community; all these are caused due to lack of jobs, an increase in drugs, and alcohol abuse," says Lavonne Yazzie. "Currently, we are working on the design aspect, architectural design for the ing to Law and Order Committee, judicial complex," said Gabriel Yazzie, Town Manager in a report that was provided to the 24th Navajo Nation Council Law and Order Committee on December 02, 2019, at Kayenta Township. "Kayenta Township set aside \$650,000.00 for the design of a 17,000 SF facility that will be located on 21.22 acre site withdrawn for Public Safety.

However, the presentation that was provided is only sche-matics, and the plans are still being developed.," said Gabriel Yazzie. On December 02, 2019, the 24th Navajo Nation Council met with Kayenta Township on Legislation No. 0308-19, an action relatallocating funds from the Sihasin Fund to the Kayenta Judicial Complex Fund Expenditure Plan Pursuant to 12 N.N.C. §§ 2501 – 2508 – Sponsored by the Honorable Nathaniel Brown and the Honorable Herman M. Daniels. The legislation was passed with a unanimous vote.

difficult because it is hard to get land; generally, the infrastructure is not as good and especially if you don't have a large customer base at hand. But you can be successful if you're strategic on where you choose to grow, and what industry you choose to be in, and what service to offer," says Smith.

Nemelka added, "the conditions on the reservation are unique, it's relatively hard to start a small business. It's difficult to start a small business anywhere, and it is even more difficult on Indian Country because of the conditions compared to more developed communities." "There is economic growth in Kayenta because it's self-governing; they have successful standing businesses in the township," says Nemelka.

On the Navajo Nation, it is challenging to start a small business, especially if you want to begin a business venture in a rural area. The land is one of the largest sources of the capitol, and capital stimulates economic growth. "One of the institutional factors is working with the land in trust by the Federal Government, which is relatively difficult to bring larger businesses to the Navajo Nation, that is why we are trying to tailor that specifically towards people who are living on the reservation," added Nemelka

"We hope we can create a sense of hope and increase their confidence by community members attending these workshops; we enjoy being in Kayenta; we think it's a target-rich environment for small businesses," concluded Smith.

KAYENTA TOWNSHIP RURAL ADDRESSING PROJECT: BRINGING 9-1-1 EMERGENCY SERVICES TO KAYENTA



Public safety, emergency responders, and dispatchers rely mostly on rural addressing. Rural addressing is the physical address of a home, dwelling, or residence, according to Navajo Nation Addressing Authority, Navajo Nation Community Development. The creation of a home address which will allow the enhancement of a 9-1-1 system, generating a permanent address that distinctly identifies a location using the Global Placement System (GPS) during an emergency incident.

Many may not know this about the Navajo Nation doesn't have a 9-1-1 system. They have call forwarding to a County or Municipal police dispatch who transfers to the nearest Navajo Police District.

The primary objective of the Enhanced 9-1-1 Addressing is to link each telephone number to a permanent address that identifies where the caller is physically located. This requires the creation of a physical address, thus to enhance the effectiveness and rapid location of properties by Public Safety Personnel, Law Enforcement, Fire and Rescue, and Emergency Medical Services in rural areas of the Navajo Nation.

UPS, FEDEx, and United States Postal Services have used 9-1-1 Enhancement and will continue these efforts all over the United States. The implementation will soon be available on the Navajo Nation.


